[1] **Women's Health Protection Act (HB 2284)** – Requires abortion clinics to be subject to the same safety and inspection standards as all other health care institutions. Also makes it a crime to help a minor obtain an abortion and avoid Arizona's parental consent requirement.

**Passed House 34-22. Passed Senate 17-13. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 15, 2014.**

[2] **Assisted Suicide Definition (HB 2565)** – Clarifies what it means to commit assisted suicide under Arizona law, allowing prosecutors to fully prosecute criminals that commit this crime. **Passed House 35-19. Passed Senate 17-11. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 30, 2014.**

[3] **Corporate Scholarship Tax Credit (SB 1048)** – Expands the Corporate Scholarship Tax Credit program to allow S-corporations to make qualifying contributions and receive a tax credit. **Passed House 35-25. Passed Senate 17-12. Vetoed by Gov. Brewer on April 23, 2014.**

[4] **ESA Revisions (SB 1237)** – Makes several clarifying changes to Arizona law to ensure the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) program operates according to how the legislature intended. **Passed House 54-1. Passed Senate 25-3. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 30, 2014.**

[5] **ESA Expansion (HB 2139)** – Expands the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) program to include siblings of current ESA recipients and children with disabilities. **Passed House 35-22. Passed Senate 16-12. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 23, 2014.**

[6] **ESA Expansion for Military Families (HB 2150)** – Allows children of active duty or KIA military to not have to meet the "switcher" requirement to gain eligibility for the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) program. **Passed House 38-18. Passed Senate 17-10. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 23, 2014.**

[7] **ESA Expansion (HB 2291)** – Expands the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) program to allow students to be eligible if they live in zip codes with a majority of the population that is under 185% of the Federal Poverty Level. **Failed House 27-31.**

[8] **Lexie's Law Scholarship Changes (HB 2328)** – Removes the "switcher" requirement to ensure that all Arizona students that meet the disabled or displaced qualification are eligible to participate in the Lexie's Law Corporate Tax Credit program. **Passed House 35-19. Passed Senate 16-12. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on May 5, 2014.**

[9] **Human Trafficking, Prostitution Penalties (HB 2454)** – Establishes an affirmative defense for girls and women who are charged with prostitution because most are victims of forced sexual servitude. Also increases the penalty for "johns" that solicit underage girls. **Passed House 58-0. Passed Senate 29-0. Signed into law by Gov. Brewer on April 22, 2014.**

[10] **Religious Freedom Restoration Act (SB 1062)** – Strengthens protections in Arizona law to defend against religious discrimination. **Passed House 33-27. Passed Senate 17-13. Vetoed by Gov. Brewer on Feb. 26, 2014.**

[11] **Church Property Tax Exemptions (HB 2281)** – Exempts churches that rent and do not own their facilities from paying most property taxes. **Passed House 33-25. Passed Senate 16-14. Vetoed by Gov. Brewer on April 22, 2014.**
