Methodology and Transparency

Target Population

Registered voters in Arizona. Voters were randomly selected from the voter registration file purchased from Numinar. Of the voters surveyed, 64.8% have voted in between two and four of the last four general elections, 17.1% have voted in one of the last four general elections, and 18.1% have voted in none of the last four general elections.

Sampling Frame & Methodology

Frame: The sample frame includes registered voters with landline and cell phone telephones. Voters without a valid landline or cellular telephone number were not contacted.

Methodology: Live survey; 11.4% live landline telephone, 51.8% live cellphone telephone, and 36.8% via text to web.

Selected voters were contacted from December 4th to 6th, 2025 using live survey and online interactive survey presented in English.

Sample Design

Contacted voters were selected randomly from a list of registered voters in the State of Arizona purchased by Data Orbital Consulting, LLC from Numinar. Individuals were randomly selected from the Voter File to mirror quotas for registered voters in Arizona. The interviewer asked for a specific member of the household but if that individual was not available, another registered voter in the household was accepted. CATI was utilized for this random sample survey.

Weighting

The sample was weighted for gender, age, race, party affiliation, education, and geographic region to mirror likely primary election voters in Arizona. Election data was sourced from Numinar and the Arizona Secretary of State.
